

# The Church's Role in Ending Child Abuse

Adopt a robust child protection policy.

# Foster a culture of support for victims.

- Develop a referral list of organizations and therapists who specialize in sexual abuse prevention and treatment.
- Post signs throughout the church building about child abuse prevention and reporting procedures.
- Publicize the church's child protection policy to communicate that the church takes child protection seriously and does not tolerate abuse.
- Post contact info for church leaders who are available to answer any questions about child safety.
- Speak about abuse publicly and often.

# Support local child protection efforts.

Provide resources and assistance to your local Child Advocacy Center (CAC), CASA, and similar organizations.

Build a support system for survivors.

The church could host support groups for survivors and assist families in finding and/or paying for licensed therapy. Your church may also designate a member of church leadership to minister to children and families affected by abuse. This person could (1) accompany the victims to interviews and court hearings, (2) be present and affirming, and (3) ask how the church can support them further.

# Host annual child protection trainings.

These trainings should be mandatory for church leadership, staff members, and volunteers — but it's a good idea to open them up to parents, too. These trainings can cover topics like:

- How to interact with a child who has disclosed abuse.
- Mandatory reporting procedures.
- Technology and internet safety.
- The contents of the church's child protection policy.
- Abuse indicators and the effects of trauma.
